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Jacob Landau Exhibit (September 16th through October 26th)

Beginning Tuesday, September 16, 2008 and continuing through Sunday, October 26, 2008, the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County is privileged to host its first major exhibit titled, "Jacob Landau: Humanist and Visionary". Featuring the extraordinary work of prominent Roosevelt artist, the late Jacob Landau (1917- 2001), the exhibit is made possible through the collaborative efforts of the Jewish Heritage Museum and the Jacob Landau Institute.

Landau's work is included in the permanent collections of the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC, the Museum of Modern Art, New York City, The Philadelphia Museum, and many other eminent museums. The Jewish Heritage Museum's exhibit will feature 23 Landau works in various mediums, including woodcut, watercolor, pen and ink, lithograph, and gouache. Several pieces will be available for purchase.

The museum and the Landau exhibit will be open to the public, without charge, on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10AM to 3PM, and Sundays from 11AM to 3PM. (Please note museum closings on Tuesday, September 30th; Thursday, October 9; and Tuesday, October 14th and 21st).

This unique Landau collection will be launched at a limited attendance, preview Gala, Sunday, September 14th. The scheduled Gala program includes an exhibit viewing; a one-hour presentation on Landau's *Holocaust Suite* by Dr. David Herrstrom, President of the Landau Institute; a musical presentation by David Brahinsky and Friends, of Roosevelt; and light refreshments. The Levi Solomon Water Tank

Is all historic property destined for a shopping center?

The Levi Solomon barn, now home of the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County, is located in the Mounts Corner shopping development in Freehold, NJ. Originally part of a Jewish colonial era farm, the barn was expanded over time. A water tank was added in the mid-nineteenth century to provide water pressure for hydrating the animals and possibly for human use. It is unlikely that it had anything to do with a mikveh.

The wooden tank remains in the renovated barn building. Six feet tall and six feet in diameter, the tank has a maximum capacity of a thirteen hundred gallons. When filled, it weighed more than five tons. Supported by heavy wooden beams, it is located approximately ten feet above the barn's newly built second floor where the museum is now housed.

Whether the tank was fed by roof collection, or by well water pumped by windmill to the tank's hayloft location, remains to be discovered.

The water tank itself was manufactured by the US Wind Engine and Pump Company, the windmill company that started the industry in 1856. The 1854 patent holder, Daniel Halladay, came from Ellington, Connecticut to Illinois to meet local business investors, and according to Robert Popeck, a collector of windmill industry memorabilia, Halladay ended up building the first factory in Batavia, Illinois. Popeck, who works for the city of Batavia, owns two windmills, and has a metal tank from US Wind Engine under one of his mills. He has seen a wooden home tank but was unable to retrieve it. Another industrial wood tank fifteen feet high and twenty-seven feet in diameter is still located in a building in Batavia, a city that boasts sixteen restored windmills.

Wooden tanks such as the Museum's are very rare. To complete the Museum's research, the property must be searched for a water well and

the base of the windmill. The current owner of the Mounts Corner center has indicated that nothing additional was found with the water tank: no gauge, no windmill, and no artifacts inside the tank. The only remaining remnant was the downspout leading from the bottom of the tank to the first floor of the barn.

The Museum's tank has stenciling that reads, "US Wind Engine & Pump Co., Batavia, Ill." The windmill company moved to Batavia in 1863, making the tank's earliest date that year. The horizontal straps and rods that keep the tank's vertical wood slats in place are significant components of the tank and the connectors that hold each piece are specific to the windmill company.

It may only be coincidence that the Jewish Heritage Museum's barn and water tank and the windmill factory in Batavia, are both in shopping centers. On the other hand, perhaps water pressure is our common thread and tie to history.

I'll drink to that.
