Board of Trustees Nominees for a New Two - Year Term

Alice Berman

Alice is a 2023 recipient of the Junior League of Monmouth County's Women Making A Difference Community Volunteer Award, which recognizes awardees for their "outstanding and invaluable service to our community." Alice was nominated in part for her work on behalf of the Monmouth County Arts Council, where she negotiated the divestiture of the

Count Basie Theater from the Arts Council, creating two independent non-profits. She served on the new Arts Council Board from 1999-2009, with six years as President.

A graduate of Ithaca College and Rutgers University with degrees in Music Education, Alice has served as director of the Temple choir at Monmouth Reform Temple for 25 years.

and served for a total of seven years. She was active in the synagogue's Monmouth Festival of the Arts, first volunteering in its café, and later as the chair of Artist Management committee, and then served for four years as Festival Co-Chair until it's final year in 2014. In 2022, she was asked to return to the Temple Board as Secretary, and is currently serving a two year term.

Alice became a Board Member of the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County in 2013. She served as Co-President from 2014-2017, and President 2019-2020. Her term of office concluded at the end of 2021. During this 18 month hiatus, she has remained Chair of the Exhibits Committee, and Team Leader for the Museum's Life and Legacy endowment gift program.

Carol Fox

After a required Museum sabbatical, Carol would once again like to join the Board of Trustees at the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County. Carol and her family have lived in Marlboro, NJ for the past twenty-seven years. In the eight years that Carol was on the Museum Board, she served on the Executive Committee, Education Committee, was Recording Secretary, is co-chair of Publications, and is the official Museum editor, including for all exhibits and for Heritage Highlights. During her time away from the Board, Carol continued to be the official Museum editor and worked on the Museum's 2022 Casino Night.

Additionally, Carol is an elected county committee woman in Monmouth County and has served as Vice-President and Board member at Marlboro Jewish Center. She has also spent much of her time volunteering for our schools. After earning her Bachelor's and Graduate degrees, Carol wrote the by-laws for school based management in NYC, wrote the by-laws for the Parent Teacher Student Organization at Marlboro High School, and was an active participant in writing a Middle States report for Marlboro High School. Moreover, Carol has served as President of Parent Teacher Organizations at several local schools and helped save an aeronautical program at a local college. As a college instructor, Carol primarily taught critical thinking and the proper way to do research. She is a licensed teacher, for all grades, in New York and New Jersey and has been hired by several publishing houses to edit their books before their publications.

Carol's Jewish heritage is very important to her, and therefore she looks forward to once again serving on the Board of Trustees.

Irene Herbin

Irene Herbin is a CPA and has lived in Monmouth County since 1997. She grew up in Forest Hills, Queens, NY, and had a strong Jewish education graduating Hebrew High School and attending Camp Ramah every summer. She is a graduate of Pace University,

Pleasantville, NY. She has worked for some of the largest Insurance Companies including AIG, Munich America Re, The Home Insurance Company (USI Re) and Transatlantic Re. In addition to her skills as a CPA, Irene is computer literate.

Since 2021, she has volunteered at the Monmouth County Historical Association helping with the Bruce Springsteen Exhibit, "Tenth Anniversary of 9/11 and It's Impact on Monmouth County," The Toys Exhibit, and "Beneath the Floorboards – Slavery in Monmouth County." She tries to stay close to her Jewish roots attending weekly Parsha classes with Rebbitzin Tova Chazanow at Chabad. Irene began volunteering at the Jewish Heritage Museum in 2021, and assisted on the installation of the exhibit honoring Rabbi Priesand, and the current Sigmund Eisner Exhibit. She also has worked as a volunteer behind the desk for many recent programs as well as at the Museum's Casino Night. Irene looks forward to contributing to the Museum as a Trustee.

Rabbi Brooks R. Susman

Rabbi Brooks R. Susman is the founding Rabbi of Congregation Kol Am of Freehold. He retired from the "pulpit" on August 1, 2015. In his rabbinate, Rabbi Susman, served congregations in New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, as well as St. Louis, Missouri. He was ordained at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1974, where he also received his Doctor of Divinity in 1999.

Having written his master's thesis on the Jewish views of Contraception and Abortion, Rabbi Susman served on the Boards of Planned Parenthood in all communities he has served. He was honored by having the boardroom of Southern Adirondack Planned Parenthood named for him. While on Long Island, the Nassau County League of Women Voters honored him with its first "Good Guy" award. While at Temple Israel on Long Island, he served as curator of the May Museum of Judaica, and in New Jersey became a founding member of The Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County. Locally, Rabbi Susman is presently a member of the Human Rights Commission for the Township of Freehold. He also serves as a board member of CrimeStoppers of Monmouth County. In 2004, a State Senate Resolution recognized Rabbi Susman's contributions to New Jersey, and in 2014 the Township of Freehold declared June 1 as "Rabbi Brooks Susman Dav."

Dr. Susman is currently an adjunct professor at Brookdale Community College teaching classes on ethics, justice, history, as well as Bible. In conjunction with the College, he leads tours to places of interest both in the Northeast, as well as Europe and Israel. He also lectures in the community with Dr. Christopher Bellitto in an interfaith dialogue on the three Abrahamic religions: historically, theologically, and

contemporaneously. Together they have been named by Brookdale as "The God Squad" noting their scholarly attitudes toward the critical questions of the 21st Century.

During his rabbinate at Congregation Kol Am, he authored the prayer book used by the congregation, T'filat Kol Am. He is also one of the committee of authors of Gates of Mitzvah and Gates of the Seasons.

A former marathon runner and ranked swimmer, Rabbi Susman has returned to boxing as his workout regimen. Rabbi Susman and his wife Andrea are Freehold residents as well as parents and grandparents.

Nominees for Reelection Two - Year Term

Arlene Goldfus Lutz

Arlene graduated from the University of Delaware with Honors and then received a Master of Liberal Arts from The Johns Hopkins University. twelfth grade Social Studies in Baltimore County, Maryland for five years. After moving to New Jersey, she taught Psychology and Sociology as an adjunct for eight years at Brookdale Community College. She then became a student at Rutgers Law School. Upon graduation she was offered a position as Deputy Assistant Counsel to Governor Thomas Kean, for whom she worked for eighteen months. She then became a Deputy Attorney General in the New Jersey Department of Law and Public Safety, where she remained for almost fifteen years, doing all types of legal matters, from litigating cases, providing advice to state agencies, and researching and arguing appellate cases. Her next position was at the New Jersey Department of Education, where for seven years she directed the legal office of the State Board of Examiners, the teacher licensing board.

Arlene has been a member of the League of Women Voters since it began in Ocean Township 49 years ago, and she has held many positions in the League. She has served as both a member of the Temple Board and as a member of the Sisterhood Board at her synagogue, previously known as Temple Beth Torah. With her husband, she spent several years working with newly arrived Jewish immigrants from the Soviet Union. For the past seven years, she has been a volunteer with the New Jersey courts, working in its program that monitors legal guardians for incompetent adults.

In 2019, Arlene began volunteering as a docent for JHMOMC, and during the quarantine she researched and wrote two articles for its publication. She collects original suffragette items, and enjoys doing genealogy research. She and her husband have two children, two children-in-law, and three grandchildren. They love traveling, and they have visited all seven continents, fifty countries and all fifty states.

The JHMOMC lies at the intersection of two of Arlene's deepest interests. She was a history major in college, and she continues to study history as an adult. In addition, she has always been fascinated with the history of the Jews, Jewish culture, Jewish philosophy and thought. Thus, a museum that specializes in the history and culture of the Jews of Monmouth County explains why she chose to be a volunteer at the Museum.

After joining the Board of Trustees two years ago, she was elected its Recording Secretary. In addition, she has been working with other Board members to create an oral history project at the Museum. Arlene's goal is to help the Museum advance its two-fold mission of connecting Jews to their heritage and presenting exhibits illustrating the history of the Jews of Monmouth County.

Richard A. Mellin

Richard became a Trustee of the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County in the early part of 2013 and became Treasurer in July 2013 and rejoined the Board in 2021. Richard is a CPA, MBA, member of the New Jersey State Society of CPA's and the American Institute of CPA's. His past Board experiences were as a founding member of the Construction Financial Management Association and as treasurer of Jewish Marriage Experience of New Jersey (Jewish Marriage Encounter).

As Treasurer for the Museum he implemented and moved our accounting system from an old outdated version of Quick Books to the online version of Quick Books residing in the cloud. This was a successful transition and has further been refined by the current team.


Richard's vision, as he returns to the Museum, is to have the Museum go forth with outreach to Middlesex County. Middlesex County is part of the combined The Jewish Federation in the Heart of New Jersey from which the Museum draws support and it would be beneficial for the Museum to have members from within that community. An example of outreach would be to contact Jewish clubs within the adult communities to offer them virtual programs and to have them email their members with information about our events.

Fundraising is also something which needs to be focused on as a means for the Museum to maintain current income to support having paid professional staff to run the day to day operations of the Museum. Volunteers are important for the guidance, special knowledge and wisdom that they provide to an organization, but they are not the day-to-day continuity of operations. Fundraising ties directly into the Finance Committee which is another area of interest.

Opening of a New Exhibit

The Jewish Heritage Museum held the Opening Reception for its current exhibit on Sunday, April 30, with the generous loan of artifacts and documents from the Red Bank Public Library, from Jan Eisner, great granddaughter of Sigmund Eisner, and Thomas Minton. The exhibit, entitled, "The Eisner Family: From Stitching Military Uniforms to Stitching Together the Red Bank Jewish Community," chronicles the story of one of the most influential Jewish residents of Monmouth County of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

In spite of the rainy weather, nearly two dozen guests enjoyed refreshments as they explored the exhibit, finding tidbits of information that made for several "ah-ha" moments. Jan Eisner was unable to attend in the afternoon, but had seen the exhibit earlier in the day, and was thrilled that her family's story was being made public, saying, "I am so grateful to the Museum for your dedication and hard work putting this together for my family." Red Bank Mayor, Billy Portman, made the connection to old stone walls that still exist on the former Eisner property in town, as well as to his own Jewish upbringing and Bar Mitzvah of which he was reminded through the Museum's Permanent Exhibit.

In 1882, as a young man newly immigrated to the United States, and with few resources, Sigmund Eisner was befriended by the Weis family which had already settled in Red Bank. Eisner sewed a few suits and clothing pieces which he sold in the Weis family store, The Temple of Fashion. Before long, he courted and married the Weis's daughter Bertha, and together they began building a business and their family. From the first sewing machines set up in their Red Bank house, the Eisners built the business which provided important opportunities to employ hundreds of Jewish and Irish immigrants, support the founding of two synagogues, and serve the Jewish and extended community in a myriad of ways.

After outgrowing his home and a converted bakery building, Eisner began construction of the factory on Bridge Avenue, which is now known as the Galleria. It operated from 1904 until the business closed in 1954. The company also established factories in Freehold, South Amboy, and Long Branch, to meet demand. By the end of the 19th century, the Company was producing uniforms for the United States military, and went on to produce uniforms for France, the United Kingdom, and Belgium for both World Wars. After the founding of the Boy Scouts, the Sigmund Eisner Company became the sole designer and producer of Boy Scout uniforms from 1911 through the early 1920s.



Touted in the press, the Eisner uniform manufacturing plant was a significant employer in Red Bank and other Monmouth County towns

The Eisners had four sons, Raymond, J. Lester, Monroe, and Victor, and each participated in some way in the family business, together incorporating the business in 1916 as The Sigmund Eisner Company.

Eisner was dedicated to civic engagement, and served the community as Red Bank's Water Commissioner, a founding member of the Red Bank YMCA, Vice President of Monmouth Medical Center, was on the Board of the NJ State Reform School for Boys, and Vice Chairman of Monmouth County Red Cross. Committed to ensuring the continuity of the Jewish community, he supported Congregation B'nai Israel, and the Eisners were members of Congregation Beth Miriam for over 25 years, where Bertha served on the Women's Auxiliary Committee.

The importance of community service was passed on to their children, as several of their sons also served on the Board of Monmouth Medical Center, the Reformatory School in Jamesburg, the Monmouth

County Red Cross, and the Monmouth Council of Boy Scouts of America.

Upon his passing, E i s n e r was recognized as "Red Bank's First Citizen" and upon Bertha's passing, their Red Bank home was donated to house the Red Bank Public Library, where it remains today.

The Eisner exhibit will be on display through the end of 2023, and we invite all members of the community to visit and explore this important piece of local history.



SHTTL




Shttl beautifully recreates and captures the life and loves of a Yiddish-speaking shtetl on the eve of the Nazi invasion of Soviet Ukraine. On a long, fading summer evening, a young man returns to his shtetl, which he learns is preparing for a wedding. To pursue a secular life in Kyiv,

the young man had left behind friends, family, and the woman he loves, but has now been drawn back to the familiar and comforting world of the shtetl. Unraveling the simmering tensions between tradition and modernity, director Ady Walter's debut masterpiece, made in the Ukraine, is captured in one extraordinary long shot, as it stunningly reconstructs a world on the precipice of disaster. Filmed in Yiddish and featuring powerful performances from Moshe Lobel, Saul Rubinek and Anisia Stasevich.

THE FORGER

The Forger is set Berlin, 1942. Cioma Schönhaus (Louis Hofmann, star of the hit Neflix series Dark) is a young Jewish man who won't let anyone takeaway his zest for life, especially not the Nazis. Since the best hiding spots are in plain sight, Cioma adopts audaciously



identity of a marine officer to escape being deported like his family before him. Drawing on his art school background, he joins a network of underground rescuers and becomes infamous for his masterfully forged IDs, created with just a brush, some ink, and a steady hand, that save the lives of hundreds of Jews by allowing them to escape the country.

DEAD SEA GUARDIANS

Three men, Oded, an Israeli Ag-tech expert, Munqeth, a Jordanian environmentalist, and Yusuf, a Palestinian lifeguard, are brought



together by their equal passions of swimming and to save the Dead Sea. From the moment they meet, their sole focus is on creating a high-profile event to capture people's attention to the environmental catastrophe happening in their own backyards. They will put together a group of international swimmers to do something that has never been done: a swim across the Dead Sea, from Jordan to Israel. The film follows this extraordinary action, hoping to achieve exposure that will drive the region's countries to take action. However, the friendship among the trio is tricky. There are significant cultural differences among them. The political realities, and the personal baggage with which each one must deal, are all explored in the film.

Most of the roughly 140,000 Holocaust survivors who came to the United States in the first decade after World War II settled in big cities such as New York, but a few thousand chose an alternative way of life on American farms. More of these accidental farmers wound up raising chickens in southern New Jersey than anywhere else. Speaking Yiddish to Chickens is the first book to chronicle this little-known chapter in American Jewish history, when these mostly Eastern European refugees – including the author's grandparents - found an unlikely refuge and gateway to new lives in the US on poultry farms. Learn about the oral history interviews Seth Stein collected in order to share the stories of the Jewish Community in Vineland, NJ and surrounding rural towns.

Senator Joseph McCarthy conducted hearings at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, in 1953 which resulted in 42 civilian employees at the Army base, 38 of them Jews, being falsely accused of Communist ties. Join Executive Director Jessica Solomon for a research talk about Fort Monmouth and the "Jewish Spies" Senator McCarthy feared would overthrow Democracy during the Cold War.

Like many businesses, The Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County is facing the impact of inflation on the operation of the Museum. Over the last 15 years, the Museum has not raised its membership dues, and has worked hard, thanks in part to wonderful volunteers, to keep programming, admission, and membership rates as low as possible for our members.
